Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the ninth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Westbrooke Elementary School serves 519 students enrolled in Kindergarten through fifth grades. The student population's ethnicity is made up of 34% Hispanic and 66% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 62% White, 25% Black, 1% Native, 7% Asian, 1% Pacific, and 4% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Alex Reyes. Westbrooke Elementary School is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Westbrooke Elementary School indicates that the average age of the collection is 2007 and the number of books per student is 23. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for a highly effective media center that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection. At this time, Westbrooke Elementary School does meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Age of Collection
 - o The average publication date of 2007 is acceptable but needs to be improved.
- Fiction vs. Nonfiction
- Categories of Concern
 - Collection by interest level
 - Reading level
 - The year of the collection due to neglected weeding of old copyright book sets and the reference shelf. When weeding is completed, the average age of the collection will greatly improve.

Representation Analysis

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.
